Welcome to Selwyn Township!

Selwyn was created by two amalgamations and one name change. The Township of Smith and the Township of Ennismore amalgamated on January 1st, 1998. The Township of Smith-Ennismore then amalgamated with the Village of Lakefield on January 1st, 2001. The Township changed its name to Selwyn Township in 2013.

Prosperous

A lively, vibrant community with a population of nearly 18,700, Selwyn Township ranks outstandingly high on the quality of life scale. With a broad economic base that includes technology, information services, healthcare, education, retail, finance, and agriculture, it is home to one of Peterborough County's most stable economies. Selwyn Township Council

Selwyn Township is a lower-tier municipality governed by a Council made up of five members. Selwyn is a part of the upper-tier Peterborough County with the Mayor and Deputy Mayor representing the Township on Peterborough County Council.

Council members serve for a four-year term of office. As part of their role as a Councillor, members also serve on a variety of Committees that support municipal operations including the Committee of Adjustment, Accessibility Advisory Committee, Library Board, Police Services Board, Heritage Committee, Trails Advisory Committee, Parks & Recreation Advisory Committee and the Economic Development & Business Committee.

Bridgenorth

The Hamlet of Bridgenorth is a small residential community situated on beautiful Chemong Lake amid a largely rural landscape. Bridgenorth offers a centralized destination for shopping and services and meets the daily needs of residents and tourists. Bridgenorth has lands suitable for a variety of commercial development.



Lakefield

The Village of Lakefield is a small urban community of approximately 3,000 people located on the Otonabee River, part of the historic Trent Severn Waterway system. Lakefield is primarily a residential community with historic homes and heritage sites carefully combined with modern residential areas. Lakefield offers many of the amenities of “big city” life in a quaint, small-town setting.



Ennismore

The Hamlet of Ennismore is historically picturesque with the post office, general store, and community church centrally located as in the days of old. Ennismore is centred in a mainly rural area and provides a focal point for community recreational and social events including hard and softball diamonds, soccer pitches, tennis and basketball courts, ice and curling rinks and reception facilities. Chemong Lake, Buckhorn Lake and Pigeon Lake border the Ennismore ward.



Young's Point

The Village of Young's Point is the home of Lock 27 on the Trent-Severn Waterway network. The lock has a lift of seven feet and was built in the early 1870s. To the south, you can travel through Katchewanooka Lake towards Lakefield and onto Peterborough, and to the north, you can travel through Clear Lake and on to Stoney Lake, Buckhorn and Pigeon Lakes and beyond. Young's Point is a key destination for thousands of cottagers in search of great shopping, restaurants, and marinas. Young's Point is also a favourite spot for nearby residents to fish, swim and picnic.

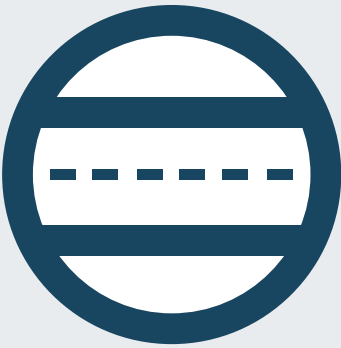


Buckhorn

The Town of Buckhorn lies on the boundary line between the Municipality of Trent Lakes and Selwyn Township, with the majority of the area in Trent Lakes. The area is rich in culture with its many art galleries, antique stores, cultural events and attractions. - Situated centrally in Peterborough County and is bordered by the City of Peterborough in the southeast.
- Most populated municipality in Peterborough County, with an approximate population of 18,653.
- Home to approximately one-third of all households in Peterborough County and 34% of the workforce.
- Selwyn Township has an average age of 47, with 14% of residents aged 0-14, 57.3% aged 15-64, and 28.7% aged 65 and over (including 2.9% who are 85+).



By Road

A network of well-maintained Township and County roads provides quick and convenient access to Highways 7, 28, 115 and 407. Selwyn Township is well situated with the City of Peterborough at our doorstep, Toronto at a 1-hour distance, and Ottawa at a 3-hour distance.



By Bus

A new rural bus route called “The Link” offers public transportation between Selwyn Township, Curve Lake First Nation and the City of Peterborough via Trent University. Bus transportation is available in Peterborough and along Highway 115 via GO Bus and Coach Canada.



By Air

The Peterborough Municipal Airport, owned by the City of Peterborough, provides business and travel charter services. Canada’s largest airport, Pearson International Airport is conveniently located only 1.5 hours away via Highway 407.

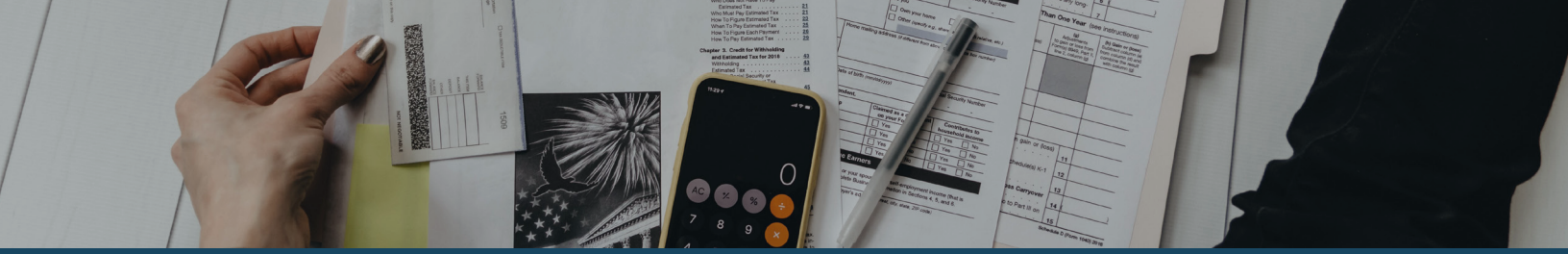

Municipal Services

Selwyn Township employs over 60 people and is responsible for services such as Roads; Parks & Recreation; Libraries; Landfills/Waste Management; Taxation; Licensing and Vital Statistics (Lotteries, Deaths, Marriages); Fire Services and Community Emergency Preparedness; Economic Development; and Building and Planning.

The majority of our services can be accessed through the Municipal Office located at 1310 Centre Line, Selwyn. The Office is open 8:30 AM to 4:30 PM from Monday to Friday. To contact the Office, call 705-292-9507 or email info@selwyntownship.ca.

Tax Information

Annual property taxes are calculated by multiplying the assessed value of your property by the municipality's current tax rate. The Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC) – mpac.ca determines the assessed value of each property.

The tax rate is made up of a Township portion, a County portion and an Education portion, which is set by the Province of Ontario.

Licensing & Government Services

The Community & Corporate Services / Clerk's Department is responsible for the issuance of Marriage Licenses, Death Registrations, Lottery Licenses, and Commissioner of Oath services following the guidelines set out by the Province of Ontario.



Roads

The Public Works Department is responsible for maintaining over 320 kilometres of roads, 13,000 metres of sidewalks, and 620 streetlights. The majority of road construction work is professionally handled in-house using Township staff, materials, and equipment; and is scheduled beginning in spring and continues through late fall.



Landfill

A Township managed Waste Disposal site is located at 1480 County Road 18 (8th Line), Selwyn. Township residents also have access to the Peterborough CountyCity Landfill located on Bensfort Road in the City of Peterborough.

A seasonal Household Hazardous Waste Depot (HHWD) is located at the Smith Landfill site from June through September. Alternatively, a year-round HHWD is located at 400 Pido Road in the City of Peterborough. Both sites are available to Township residents for the disposal of Hazardous Waste items.

Garbage & Recycling

Curbside garbage collection is contracted out to a private waste collector and is coordinated through Selwyn Township.

Curbside recycling, organic waste and seasonal leaf & yard waste collection are contracted out to a private collector through Peterborough County. Currently, curbside collection of organic waste is only available in the Hamlet of Bridgenorth, where fruit and vegetable scraps, meats and bones, tissues and paper towels are set out in a Green Cart (provided by Peterborough County) for collection. Recreation Services

Recreation and leisure opportunities play an important role in our community by allowing us to engage in physical activity, healthy lifestyles, interact with one another, and experience our natural environment. Selwyn Township boasts an array of services and amenities available to individuals visiting the community.

The Township's Parks & Recreation Department manages the operations of two community centres, both with ice arenas and banquet facilities. Several facilities are also available to provide for year-round receptions, meetings and programs for the community. Along with its facilities, there are also 5 parks with 52 hectares of parkland, 3 trail systems, 3 beaches and a marina to enjoy outdoor activities of all kinds!

Building & Planning

The Building & Planning Department is responsible for the issuance of all building permits per the Building Code Act, and the provision of building and plumbing inspection services. The Department also coordinates all planning-related matters including Zoning By-law issues and amendments, and minor variance applications. The Department is also responsible for property standards issues in the municipality.

Economic Development

Selwyn Township is a welcoming municipality for any new or expanding business. Low municipal taxes, an available and knowledge-ready workforce and updated infrastructure present great opportunities for any business or developer. Hydro

Municipal water and wastewater services are available in the Lakefield Ward and the Woodland Acres Subdivision. Selwyn Township owns and maintains the day-to-day operations of these two systems.

Private well and septic systems service the majority of the remainder of the Township.

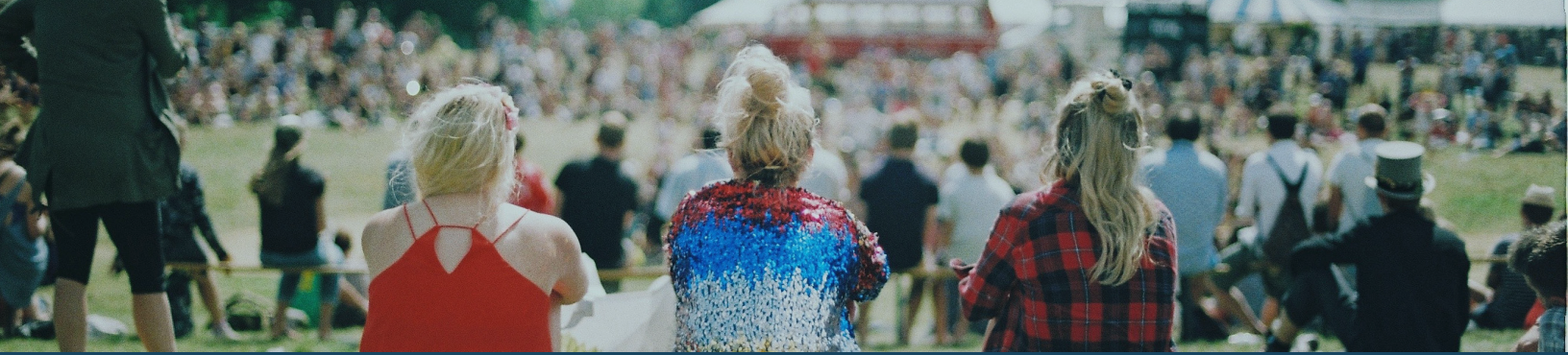

Police Services

There are two Police Services in Selwyn Township, the Peterborough Police Service, which serves the Village of Lakefield; and the Peterborough County Ontario Provincial Police (OPP), which serves the remainder of the Township.

Paramedics

Peterborough County/City Paramedics (PCCP) are committed to promoting the safety and well-being of its citizens. PCCP and paramedics serve as the front-line of our emergency health care system and play a critical role in the provision of emergency care and treatment of a patient's medical condition or injuries. Ambulance Service is provided by the Peterborough County/City EMS (Emergency Medical Services) Department.
